What is Teamwork

"...the nature and quality of individual team members' contributions to the team" (Hughes & Jones, 2011)

"... behaviors under the control of individual team members (effort they put into team tasks, their manner of interacting with others on team, and the quantity and quality of contributions they make to team discussions)" (AACUVALUE RUDFIC)

Teamwork (process) ≠ Team success (product)

Teamwork is Challenging to Assess

- Hard to observe
- Difficult to specify
- Subjective judgment
- Social factors that interfere
