Understanding the academic program in relation to the job market landscape can provide valuable insight into evaluating program alignment and identifying new opportunities and/or improvement. Therefore this report aims to help programs identify its values and keep programs relevant and effective in preparing students for success in the labor market. Relevant Skills	• What skills or knowledge should students gain through our program? What skills are employers looking for based on the skills listed in their job postings?
	<ul> <li>What gaps, if any, exist between what employers are looking for and what the workforce showcase in their profiles or resumes? How can this inform competencies or skills our program can emphasize in our curriculum?</li> </ul>

### Glossary

CIP	Classification of Instructional Programs; standard numerical code for post-secondary course of study developed by NCES to provide a taxonomic scheme to support accurate tracking and reporting of fields of study and program completions activity (Source: NCES)
CIP-to-SOC Mapping	Connects educational programs with target occupations to show potential higher education talent pipelines into occupations by matching postsecondary programs of study that provides graduates with specific skills and knowledge to occupations that often require those skills and knowledge. (Source: NCES, BLS).
Completions	The number of degrees or certificates conferred for a specific course of study in a given year.  Completions includes all award levels and both primary and secondary majors (Source: NCES, IPEDS).
soc	Standard Occupational Classification system used by federal statistical agencies to classify workers into occupational categories (Source: BLS)
