Why should I major in human services at Cal State Fullerton?

Human services is one of the fastest growing fields in the country, according to the U.S. Department of Labor. In fact, California will need over 100,000 human service workers in the next seven years. The Human Services Program at Cal State Fullerton emphasizes self-awareness, an integration of theories and practice, and applied learning through experience in fieldwork placements in community agency settings. When students graduate from Cal State Fullerton, they are prepared to excel in any field that seeks a well-rounded person with relevant, marketable skills.

The human services major at Cal State Fullerton offers:

Outstanding Faculty - Our faculty members are accomplished teachers and researchers, hold advanced degrees from prestigious universities and have authored textbooks used in class.

Great Credentials - The Human Services Program is one of the few undergraduate programs on the west coast that have been approved by the National Council for Standards in Human Service Education.

Flexibility - Classes meet to coincide with your work schedules, during the day, in the evening and on Saturdays. We also offer several classes at the Irvine Campus and at the Social Services Agency in Santa Ana.

What is a human services major?

A typical human services major is someone who is intelligent, compassionate, resourceful and wishes to pursue a helping profession such as social work, counseling, psychotherapy or teaching. Human services majors receive the academic preparation and hands-on training required for lifelong careers in one of hundreds of fulfilling jobs that seek to bring about a positive change in society, as well as in individuals and families.

What types of career opportunities are available?

About half of the graduates of our human services program go on to graduate programs, typically in social work, counseling, psychology, public administration or education. A human services professional may provide direct services to clients, supervise personnel, administer programs and develop policies,

and/or deliver support services to professional staff. To give you an idea of the variety of positions, we've listed several career options, some of which may require an advanced degree. This is only a partial list, but should give you a good idea of the diversity of jobs for which a human services education would prepare you: adoption counselor, art/play therapist, AIDS services case manager, child protective service worker, client advocate, community educator, correctional caseworker, elementary school teacher, geriatric caseworker, human services agency administrator, parent educator, policy analyst, probation officer, school counselor, social service employee, YMCA youth counselor, and numerous positions in the government sector.

What are the requirements for the major?

The Bachelor of Science in Human Sciences requires students to complete 54 units, which includes a core curriculum of 36 units and an adviser-approved advisement track of 18 units related to the student's anticipated professional specialization.

Note: The practicum/fieldwork/internship courses must be taken in sequence. Only one fieldwork course may be taken in a given semester.

Required advisement track (18 units):

Advisement tracks should be planned in consultation with the Human Services academic adviser in the area of the student's anticipated professional specialization. Advisement tracks include:

Mental Health - Prepares students for entry-level positions in a variety of settings and for graduate work in counseling, social work, clinical psychology, or marriage and family therapy.

Administration and Community Practice - Designed for students wishing to pursue graduate study in social work administration and policy, community organization and planning.

Elementary Education - Developed for students who are interested in pursuing an elementary school teaching career.

Gerontology - Developed for students interested in working with the elderly.

Substance Abuse Treatment and Prevention - Developed for students who want to work with clients with substance abuse problems.

Persons with Disabilities - Developed for students who are interested in working with physical, developmental, cognitive, and/or psychiatric disabilities in the human services or educational setting.

Individualized Advisement Track - Students may develop their own track in consultation with the Human Services academic advisor.

Is a minor available?

Human services does offer a minor. Students need to complete 21 units. The minor provides a structured selection of courses, which can complement other majors and minors, by providing practical applications of theory, foundations, self-exploration and supervised fieldwork. Please consult the university catalog for required courses and more details.

What courses will transfer from my community college?

Many of your courses will transfer as general education classes. Cal State Fullerton accepts a maximum of 70 transferable units from community colleges. The department accepts up to 12 community college transfer units taken at the lower-division level. Eighteen units may be transferred into the major if a student has a drug and alcohol, eating disorder or human services generalist certificate from a community college. These units are part of the 70 units that the university accepts. Consult your college's articulation document for specifics, and check with your Human Services adviser for details.

What's special about Cal State Fullerton human services majors?

Internships – Cal State Fullerton's Bachelor of Science in Human Services is one of the few undergraduate human services program on the west coast that is approved by the National Council for Standards in Human Service Education. This is in part because of the intensive internship requirement of the major. Students complete three semesters of fieldwork placements, each for 120 hours of supervised practice.

CSUF/ Social Services Agency Educational Partnership - Cal State Fullerton offers the human services degree program at the Social Services Agency of Orange County in Santa Ana. This partnership provides social service employees access to higher education through the on-site program.

What scholarships are available?

Each year, thousands of dollars are available to human services majors with junior- and senior-class standing. Check the bulletin boards in our department office, located in Education Classroom Building 405, for application dates and qualifications, and be sure to apply. Awards include those for outstanding academic performance, potential for scholarship, or campus and community service. What student activities can I join?

The Human Services Student Association is a student-driven organization that is dedicated to providing experiences in the human services field as well as social and educational activities for the members. The Association raises funds for charities, sponsors campus activities, and organizes a variety of social activities, which supply a networking environment for members.

Who advises me?

The Human Services academic adviser offers advisement for human services students in Education Classroom Building 479A. Advisement may be done on a “drop-in” basis, but it is highly recommended that students make appointments by calling (714) 278-3015 or 278-5472.
