Summer Medical and Dental Education Program (SMDEP)

SMDEP is a FREE six-week summer academic enrichment program for college freshmen and sophomore students who are interested in the fields of medicine or dentistry.

Medical School Admission Requirements (MSAR®)

MSAR® is the preeminent and reliable resource on U.S. and Canadian medical schools and is available as a printed guidebook and searchable web site. The guidebook includes in-depth information about preparing to apply to and attend medical school, as well as abridged profiles of each medical school. The MSAR Online provides comprehensive listings of each medical school and baccalaureate/M.D. programs and includes customized search and comparison tools to help identify programs that meet individual criteria. Fee Assistance Program (FAP®)

Medical College Admissions Test (MCAT®)

Virtually all U.S. and many Canadian medical schools require the MCAT exam for admission to medical school. Students can get free information online about the exam, learn how to prepare, find out when to take the exam and discover how their scores figure in the admissions process. American Medical College Application Service (AMCAS®)

AMCAS is a non-profit, centralized application processing service that is only available to applicants entering their first-year of classes at participating U.S. medical schools.
