Center for Internships and Community Engagement



Outreach, Recruitment and Orientation

Academic Tours Drive Yield

- oRO partnered with five academic colleges Business & Economics, Education, Engineering & Computer Science, Natural Sciences & Mathematics, and the Arts to host major-specific tours for prospective and admitted students. The impact was clear: 84-100% of admitted students who attended these tours accepted their admission offers.
- » The College of Business and Economics led with 135 students and an 84% yield

Titan Hub

The Titan Hub is CSUF's onestop destination for a wide array of student services to support Titans with a group of friendly and supportive information specialists to get help regarding:

- The campaign focused on providing virtual and inperson support, increasing awareness and accessibility to financial aid resources, and ensuring students were wellinformed about the application processes and deadlines.
- » A key campaign highlight was the second annual "Funding Your Future at Cal State Fullerton" event on February 1, 2025.
 - This event gave students valuable insights into financial aid options, scholarship opportunities, and hands-on support with their 2025-26 FAFSA/CADAA.



Office Milestone:

The Scholarships Office hosted a Grand Opening Celebration on November 8, 2024, marking an important milestone in expanding scholarship support services.

Supporting Incoming Titans

- » Titan Hub staff conducted FAFSA workshops and supported general inquiries.
- Counselors and Technicians met with over 375 families to discuss financial aid packages and next steps in becoming a Titan.
- The Scholarships Office had an information booth available, to help share important information about the scholarship process and upcoming CSUF application period.

Identity and Belonging

Athletics Academic Services

Academic Excellence & Support

Titan student-athletes earned a record-high 3.13 GPA in Spring 2025 – the highest in program history. Additionally, the Fall 2024 all-student athlete GPA was 3.08. Weekly academic counseling supported students with planning, study strategies, and tutoring referrals. The **DEGREE Program engaged** over 152 student-athletes in 1-4 academic lab sessions per week, emphasizing eligibility, retention, and academic confidence.

A new cohort-based pilot program for MATH 115A and



MATH 120/20S launched in partnership with Academic Affairs and the

University Learning Center, incorporating embedded tutors and supplemental instruction. An expanded version of this cohortbased pilot is set to launch in Fall 2025.

Workshops & Professional Development

Fall 2024 included the **DEGREE Student Staff** Development series, "Power of Positive Team" Workshop Part 3, and a Drug and Alcohol awareness session delivered through Canvas.

Civic Engagement & Leadership

Student-athletes led Civic Engagement Day, distributing 300 ballot info flyers and organizing a Ballot Bowl Election Day event with 270 attendees. Civic engagement continued through Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) meetings and programming.



Recognition & Community

Titan Awards Night welcomed 270 guests - including studentathletes, coaches, and campus leaders - for an evening of celebration, headlined by keynote speaker and former NFL player Ryan Leaf.

Other community events included the Fall 2024 Welcome Back Event and the Spring 2025 Kick-Off Event. Additional communitybuilding events included monthly SAAC meetings and a Holiday Celebration to close Fall 2024.

Center for Scholars

Throughout the Fall 2024 semester, the Center for Scholars hosted a robust slate of programming that advanced student success, promoted graduate education access, and deepened community care across its six scholar populations. Events spanned professional development, mental wellness, identityaffirming community spaces, and collaborative campus partnerships. All rooted in supporting the holistic development of firstgeneration, former foster youth, and underrepresented student scholars.



Key Highlights:

» Graduate School Readiness & Access

A targeted fall series supported graduate school readiness by providing scholars with an application overview, a personal statement workshop, and a panel of donors and CSUF staff. In partnership with the Graduate Studies office, these events demystified the graduate school process and boosted scholar confidence in pursuing advanced degrees.

Wellness & Belonging Initiatives

The Center partnered with CAPS to provide stress management workshops, student socials, and intentional self-care spaces during finals week, which served over 70 students and logged 139 visits. These efforts supported emotional wellbeing and built a culture of sustained self-care especially during highstress periods.

» Community Building & Scholar Cohesion

 Through cohort-specific gatherings, large-scale socials, and the Center's annual Friendsgiving dinner, the department cultivated inclusive spaces for students to connect, reflect, and build peer support networks. These events emphasized the importance of shared celebration and collective care in strengthening scholar belonging.

Campus Collaborations & Advocacy

 A key highlight of the semester was a filmed conversation featuring Chancellor García and representatives from the Gates Foundation, spotlighting the value of a college degree and the lived experiences of CSUF Scholars.

Educational Opportunity Program

Student Transition & Support

FOP relaunched its inperson Residential Summer Bridge Program, welcoming 45 incoming students for an immersive, multi-week experience focused on early academic support, community-building, and resource navigation. In Fall 2025, one of the largest cohorts of EOP first-year and transfer students will enter the program, reflecting growing demand for access and equitybased support.

Expanded Student Center Engagement

The EOP Student Center introduced a revitalized engagement model, transforming the space into a high-impact hub for:

- Peer mentoring and community programming
- Drop-in counseling support
- Workshops on academic skills, wellness, and financial literacy
- Resource navigation and quiet study

The center now welcomes 25-30 students daily and facilitated 800+ counseling appointments this academic year



Events & Campus Partnerships

- First-Gen Week & Celebration drew 700 attendees, featuring workshops, a resource fair, food trucks, music, and community-building activities.
- EOP collaborated with partners including Financial Aid, MSI, TAPP, and ASI to deliver programming on job readiness, mentorship, and student success.

Digital Outreach

Social media engagement grew by 40%, boosting student awareness and participation across events and services.

Transfer Adult Re-entry Parenting & Pregnant Student Center

Community Building & Engagement

The TAPP Center hosted a wide range of high-impact programs to support CSUF's large transfer population and adult learners. The department also hosted a Peer Mentorship Kickoff event, introducing mentors to mentees, highlighting the program, and hosting community-building activities.

TransferFest celebrated transfer students—who make up 45% of the CSUF population – with a campus resource fair, Titan Radio, student performances, and free lunch

- » Themed events included Visions & Vibes, Transfer Mixer & Mocktails, Top 10 Resources for Transfer Students, and a Black Transfer Mixer in partnership with Black Student Success and Black Titan Success.
- » Seasonal gatherings like the Holiday Mixer, Family Winter Celebration, Shop with a Cop, and Tuffy's Tidings brought students and families together in festive community spaces.
- Additional engagement included Fall in Love with Fullerton, Lunch & Learns, post-election processing spaces, and first-gen programming tailored to transfer students


Academic & Leadership Support

» Transfer Thursdays provided targeted evening workshops on internships, imposter syndrome, academic policies, and navigating CSUF systems.

- Advising for Transfers was offered throughout the fall to support student transition
- » Three TAPP student-staff members – Imelda Diaz, Rian Rivera, and Jasmine Solis – were selected as NUFP Fellows for 2025–26, highlighting their leadership in equity and student success

Direct Student Support

- » The TAPP Center recorded 3,800+ student check-ins during the Spring semester alone, with peak usage in March and sustained engagement through May.
- » During Finals Week, TAPP partnered with Housing & Residential Engagement to distribute care bags and offer caffeine, snacks, scantrons, and blue books via the Finals Week Care Cart.



Celebration & Recognition

The End-of-Year Celebration honored graduating TAPP students with a ceremony, speeches, photos, and hors d'oeuvres, drawing 130 participants to recognize their achievements. Graduating students received a TAPP stole, and the children of parenting students were gifted cords to acknowledge their presence and significance in their parents' academic journey.

TRIO Student Support Services

Workshops & Student Development

Throughout 2024-25, TRIO SSS offered a robust lineup of workshops focused on career readiness, financial wellness, graduate school prep, and personal development – reaching more than 320 participants. Topics included:

- » Job Searching, Resume Building, and Post-Grad Transitions
- » Grad School 101, Ace Your Interview, and Personal Statements for Graduate School
- » Stress Management, College Cash Flow, and Spending with Purpose
- » Mastering Your Credit, Arboretum Wellness Walk, and De-Stress with SSS: Clay & Community
- » Día de los Muertos: Through Film and Art

Advising & Drop-In Support

The TRIO team provided over



340 one-on-one advising appointments

across the academic year, including orientation support for new students, mid-semester check-ins, and year-end planning.

» Additional engagement included 42 Student Center visits, 36 front desk visits, and 7 informal drop-ins for quick support and resources.

Special Events & Cultural Enrichment

TRIO students participated in high-impact experiences designed to foster connection, celebrate identity, and expand access to cultural learning:

- » Graduate Celebration honored13 seniors
- A field trip to see Hamilton at the Segerstrom Center introduced many students to their first live theater experience
- » A STEM-focused visit to Disney Parks provided immersive academic enrichment

Veterans Resource Center

Student Engagement & Community Building

The VRC hosted a wide range of programs throughout 2024–25 to foster connection, promote well-being, and celebrate the contributions of military-connected students:

- » Spring Transfer Welcome Events brought together over 100 students for breakfast and lunch gatherings to reintroduce them to campus resources
- PAVE (Peer Advisors for Veterans Education) hosted service and wellness initiatives including beach cleanups, a mindfulness exhibit, midterm de-stress events, Beachside Bonding by the Bonfire, and a Holiday Potluck

- Hosted 10 CSU Apply
 Workshops and a Region
 Campus Tour to guide
 prospective students through
 the transfer process
- » Engaged 150 prospective students at the Experience CSUF Showcase, highlighting VRC programs and services

Recognition & Training

- » Veteran Appreciation Night honored graduating students, veterans, and campus partners with a formal recognition ceremony
- » Continued delivery of Vet Net Ally Training for CSUF faculty and staff, strengthening campuswide understanding of military culture and student veteran needs
- » Participated in the campuswide Mental Health Resource Fair to connect students with wellness resources

Engagement and Well-Being

Dean of Students

Student Support & Outreach

Care Services provided proactive programming throughout the academic year to help students successfully navigate campus life and access support when needed. Key sessions included:

- » The team delivered several educational presentations for the campus community, including a Basic Needs Services Overview for Career Coaches, an Overview for RA Training, and an Overview for EOP.
- » Care Services Overview: Presented to Child and Adolescent Studies 100 students, introducing available support programs and resources.
- » Engaging with Professors: Offered guidance on communicating effectively with faculty and knowing when to seek help.
- » Navigating CSUF: Delivered practical tips and resource navigation strategies to aid in student transition and success.
- » Supporting Students in Distress: Trained campus stakeholders to recognize signs of student distress and respond with appropriate intervention and referrals.



Assistant Deans for Student Affairs

The Assistant Dean Program has been revitalized through a partnership between Student Affairs and Academic Affairs to deliver holistic, college-based student support. Assistant Deans will coordinate care referrals, advise inter-club councils, manage scholarships, and tailor services to each college's unique needs.

Care Services

Care Services Outreach & Education

- » Care Services delivered 10 presentations in collaboration with campus partners, reaching over 200 students.
- The most requested session, "Engaging with Professors: Effective Strategies for Seeking Support," helped students build confidence in navigating academic relationships and accessing help.

Student Support and Outreach

» Care Services responded to over 500 referrals throughout the year, providing personalized outreach and connecting students to essential resources and support systems.

Basic Needs Services

Student Support & Outreach

» Basic Needs Services recorded over 5,300 student visits to access hygiene supplies and Tuffy's Career Closet in 2024-25, distributing more than 18,400 hygiene products to help students feel prepared and supported.

Basic Needs Services received

585 direct requests for

food, housing, or financial assistance,

with the highest monthly volume in October (92).

- over 5,300 visits, with peak usage in October (721) and April (630). Over 4.000 visits were specifically for hygiene needs and over 1,300 visits were for career closet access.
 - » Staff also delivered over 50 programs and trainings throughout the academic year focused on financial wellness, resource navigation, and life skills.

Events & Recognition

» In November, Hunger & Homelessness Awareness Week helped spotlight essential student needs, while Basic Needs Services was featured in the Orange County Register and CSUF News for its financial wellness peer mentorship program.



Basic Needs - Events & Recognition

Five CalFresh Outreach & Enrollment Days – held in partnership with the County of Orange Social Services Agency – connected students with eligibility screening, application support, and interviews. Info tables provided additional education on CalFresh benefits and nutrition assistance.

Student Conduct

Academic Integrity & **Ethical Engagement**

"All Al: 2025 Al for Everyone": Event to Explore **Transformative Power of Artificial Intelligence hosted** by the Division of Academic Affairs. Partnered with Academic Affairs, IT, and the Faculty Development Center in the second annual symposium to focus on recent developments and impacts of AI in higher education.

- AI & Academic Integrity Workshops: Partnered with the Faculty Development Center and CSUF colleges and student support services to provide outreach, education and support to students and faculty regarding artificial intelligence and academic honesty in the classroom.
- International Day of Action for Academic Integrity: Hosted a day-long event in collaboration with the International Center for Academic Integrity, promoting shared responsibility for academic honesty across students, faculty, and staff.

Empowerment & Bystander Education

- Bystander Intervention Programming: Co-hosted two events with Title IX and Gender Equity:
 - Be Aware, Take Care tabling event
 - An in-depth bystander training session encouraging students to take action and access campus resources.
- **Ethical Decision-Making** Workshop: Collaborated with Housing & Residential Engagement to support student learning in real-world ethical scenarios.

Student Success & Community Outreach

- Dreams to Degrees: A twoday initiative promoting Spring registration, helping students navigate barriers to course enrollment and stay on track for graduation.



This event is an opportunity for allies to show their solidarity with survivors of sexual violence by wearing denim, posting photos, and sharing messages of support. TitanTHRIVE hosted a solidarity event along Titan Walk partnering with TitanWELL, TitanMED, the TitanHEALTH Hut, CAPS, Basic Needs, TAPP, Alpha Chi Omega, and the Department of Gender & Sexuality Studies. Hundreds of Titans engaged with the event for awareness and expressions of solidarity and were encouraged to take photos to post to their social media to show their networks that they stand against violence in their relationships and communities.

Associated Students, Inc.

Student Governance

- The ASI Board of Directors voted unanimously to reaffirm the ASI Student Wellness Initiative (ASWI), which was approved by CSUF President Ronald Rochon in March.
- The ASWI directly addresses student-identified wellness needs by expanding resources, upgrading facilities, and enhancing programs to support holistic well-being and academic success at CSUF.

ASI student leaders collaborated with CSUF officials to lead a campaign for the 2024 Ballot Bowl, hosted by the California Secretary of State. CSUF secured first place among CSU campuses with **2,149 new voters** registered and ranked second statewide.





Women's Golf Big West Champions & Postseason Run

- Fullerton dominated the Big West Championship, leading after each day and winning by 13 strokes after shooting 3-over par 867 as a team. Kaitlyn Zermeno Smith took home the individual title. becoming the first Titan to do so since Martina Edberg in 2017. Zermeno Smith shot an impressive 3-under par 213 to claim The Big West title. The junior tied a program record with a 7-under par 65 in the second round while shooting 75 and 73 in the first and third rounds. Zermeno Smith was named Big West Golfer of the year, giving the Titans backto-back winners after Davina Xanh earned the award in 2023-24.
- The Titans earned Big West
 Golfer of the Month four times
 throughout the 2024-25
 season and had four individual
 tournament winners in
 Louise Dahl, Xanh and Smith
 (2x) along with two team
 tournament wins. Four Titans
 earned Big West accolades
 following the 2024-25 season,
 the most in program history.
 Fullerton finished the year
 ranked No. 69 in the country,
 the highest final ranking in
 program history.



Titans had a historic season in 2024-25, winning its first ever Big West Championship title and advancing to the NCAA Regionals for the first time in program history. The Titans placed fifth in the regional to punch a ticket to the NCAA Championships, becoming just the eighth Big West team to do so and first since 2015. Fullerton became the first-ever No. 10 seed at a regional to make the NCAA Championship.

Track & Field Regional & Nationals Recap - include small recap of Indoor Regionals

- » Both the indoor and outdoor teams represented the Titans well, breaking records and appearing in conference, regional and national championships.
- Titans sophomore, lan Dossman, started the season being ranked first in the nation in the 100m and 200m and broke multiple school records throughout the season. Dossman was also named Big West Athlete of the Week after his impressive Challenge Cup performance. Luke Hitchcock, Joshua Hornsby, Jonathan Pfieffer and the men's relay teams broke five Cal State Fullerton records. Alvssa Heinlein, Olivia Walker and the women's 4x400 relay team added to the 2025 tally of broken program records
- The Titans men's team was the Big West runner-up with 167 points while the women put together 58 points at the Conference Championships
- Fullerton dominated the
 4x100m relays at the Big
 West Championships as
 both the men's and women's
 teams stood at the top of the
 podium. The men's team also
 claimed victory in the 4x400m
 relay. Isaiah Emerson (400m),
 Brooklyn Davis (100m), Abel
 Jordan (110m hurdles) and
 Hawkin Miller (shot put) each
 earned their way to individual
 Big West Championship titles



- » The season kept rolling and the records kept breaking as 19 student-athletes were sent to the NCAA West First Round. The 19 athletes were the most regional qualifiers in school history.
- Dominic Gates, John Clifford,
 Hornsby, Emerson and
 Dossman were the five
 athletes to represent the
 Titans in Eugene, Oregon
 at the NCAA DI National
 Championship. Hornsby
 competed in the 110m hurdles
 while the other four were on
 the 4x100 relay team.
- » Hornsby wrapped up the outdoor season being named NCAA DI Second-Team All-American in the 110m hurdles event.
- The indoor season looked no different than outdoor as more new records were set and more championship appearances were made
- » Camren Willis started off the indoor slate breaking a program record for the men's long jump and Rahsaan Dozier joined, recording a new triple jump record. Jordan and

- Hitchcock did not let a roof stop them from breaking records inside as well. Jordan beat his own school record in the 60m hurdles and Hitchcock set a new program record in the men's mile.
- » Jordan and Jahzara Davis were both named MPSF Athlete of the Week after the first week of indoor competition.
- » At the MPSF Indoor Championships, Mayalee Osola, Maleik Pabon, Tony Chavez, Dossman, Hitchcock, and the men's distance medley relay team set six more school records. The Titans recorded seven podium finishes at the championship and Miller was the only Titan to finish at the top of the podium.
- » Jordan made his way to Virginia for the NCAA Indoor Championships and competed in the men's 60m hurdles.

- Under Oaks Garcia, the Titans recorded a 37-15 overall record and 22-5 record in conference play, including a 6-5 upset over the then 15-0 No. 5 LSU Tigers at the prestigious Judi Garman Classic.

- The Titans dominated both at the plate and in the circle, leading the conference in batting average (.342), slugging (.454), hits (501), stolen bases (92), shutout wins (14) and saves (5). Their .342 team batting average set a program record and ranked 13th nationally.
- Junior infielder Ava Arce had a standout season, hitting 12 home runs and leading the conference with a .409 batting average, .701 slugging percentage, 67 hits and 62 RBI. Her 60th RBI broke the program record for most in a single season, surpassing Olympic gold medalist Jenny Topping's 2001 mark of 59. Arce was named the Big West Field Player of the Year, and earned spots on the NFCA All-West Region Second Team

- and All-Big West First Team. She was also voted a four-time Big West Field Player of the Week.
- pioned Arce as a power hitter, receiving Big West Freshman Field Player of the Year honors after slashing .380/.583/.428 with seven home runs and 44 RBI. Lozano's first collegiate hit was a three-run home run against No. 3 Oklahoma. Freshman Eva Hurtado was named Big West Freshman Pitcher of the Year, and earned a spot on the All-Freshman Team with an Honorable Mention.
- The Titans earned five All-Conference First Team, two Second Team, and three Freshman Team selections, with four players earning Honorable Mentions.

Softball Regular Season Champions

- Titans Softball collected a program-high 18 All-Conference accolades, including Gina Oaks Garcia's first Big West Coach of the Year award in her first year as head of Titans Softball. Oaks Garcia coached the Titans to their second straight regular-season Big West Championship title, marking the 20th overall conference title for the program, while being the 13th as a member of The Big West.
- Under Oaks Garcia, the Titans recorded a 37-15 overall record and 22-5 record in conference play, including a 6-5 upset over the then 15-0 No. 5 LSU Tigers at the prestigious Judi Garman Classic.
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- Freshman Nataly Lozano joined Arce as a power hitter, receiving Big West Freshman Field Player of the Year honors after slashing .380/.583/.428 with seven home runs and 44 RBI. 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Men's Golf - Tegan Andrews Regionals

- » Tegan Andrews concluded his career as a Titan with his second consecutive NCAA Division I Men's Golf Regional appearance. At the Reno Regional, he shot 9-over par 225 to tie for 39th place, improving from his 19-over par 229 run at the 2023-24 Rancho Sante Fe Regional.
- » Andrews earned his second All-Big West First Team honor, leading the Titans in nine of their 11 tournaments. He was crowned co-champion at the GCU Invitational after a 6-hole playoff, finishing at 9-under par 204. Andrews averaged 70.5 strokes per round in his final season, shooting par or better in eight tournaments, including a season-low 66 in three rounds.
- Throughout his career, Andrews earned Big West Golfer of the Year recognition, two First Team All-Big West selections and three Big West Golfer of the Month awards. Andrews ranks second in program history with nine single-season top 10 finishes (2023-24), and the secondlowest 54-hole individual total score of 201 at the 2023 Nick Watney Invitational.
- » Conference First Team, two Second Team, and three Freshman Team selections, with four players earning Honorable Mentions.

Tennis - Fall Tournament Success

The Titans duo of Sein and Marija Nikitash represented the Big West for the first time in women's doubles at the ITA Conference Master's Tournament in Rome Georgia. They fell in their opening match against Andrea/Beltran and Marley Lambert of the University of Denver. However, they made it to the consolation bracket semifinals after defeating Natalia Michta/Liliya Dimova of Seattle University in the first round and Diana Zuba/Dasha Chichkina of Saint Francis University in the Quarterfinals. They were eliminated in the semifinals against Daniella Oneil/Maria Turchetto from Liberty University. The pairing Sein Myoung and Mariia Nikitash also won the Beach Tennis Fall Tournament title prior to the ITA Conference Master's Tournament.
