FACULTY CONSTITUTION AMENDMENT UPS 100.000 QUESTION 1: Composition of the International Education Committee

Section 12. The **International Education Committee** shall consist of the following: an Admissions Officer (selected by the Assistant Vice President of Enrollment Services), the University Representative to the CSU Academic Council of International Programs, the Associate Vice President for <u>Academic-International</u> Programs, the Director of International Education and Exchange, the campus International Programs Coordinator, and the Dean, University Extended Education. In addition, there shall be five faculty members (with no more than one from any college) elected by the Academic Senate and two students appointed by Associated Students, Inc.

QUESTION 2: Revision of UPS 100.000 Academic Senate Constitution

Per UPS 100.000, Article IX, Section 5, the Constitution Committee shall review the Constitution and Bylaws of the Academic Senate each year, and shall recommend such changes as may be needed.

Members of the Constitution Committee (Jack Bedell, Keith Boyum, Vince Buck, Bob Emry, Sandra Sutphen; Emily Bonney and John Davis) met throughout fall semester. After reviewing the Constitution and Bylaws, the Committee recommended substantial revision of the Constitution to improve its organization.

Asserting that the Constitution should reflect a statement of principles rather than mechanisms, the Committee recommended moving five sections from the Constitution to the Bylaws: Terms and election of Academic Senate Members; Basic and Special Constituencies; Voting for Constituency and At-Large Seats; Standing Committees: Composition; and Procedures for Conducting a Referendum. *Note:* Amendments to the Bylaws require Academic Senate deliberation and an affirmative vote by an absolute majority of those present (rather than the unanimous vote required for Constitutional amendments).

On 2-24-11, the Academic Senate voted to approve the amendments proposed by the Constitution Committee, with the exception of moving the first two sections (Terms and election of Academic Senate Members; Basic and Special Constituencies). These sections were retained in ARTICLE II of the Constitution, as amended.
