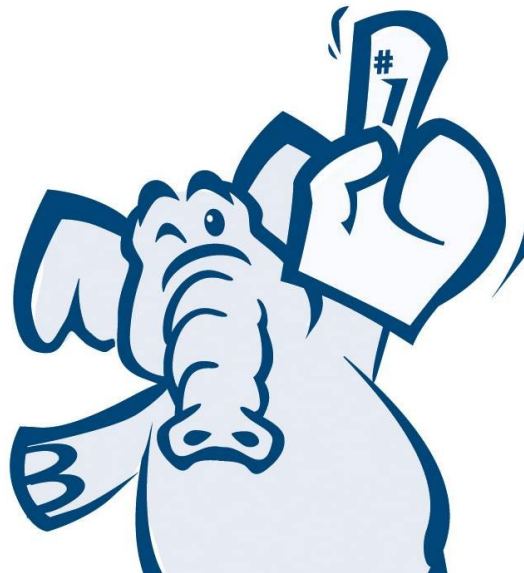

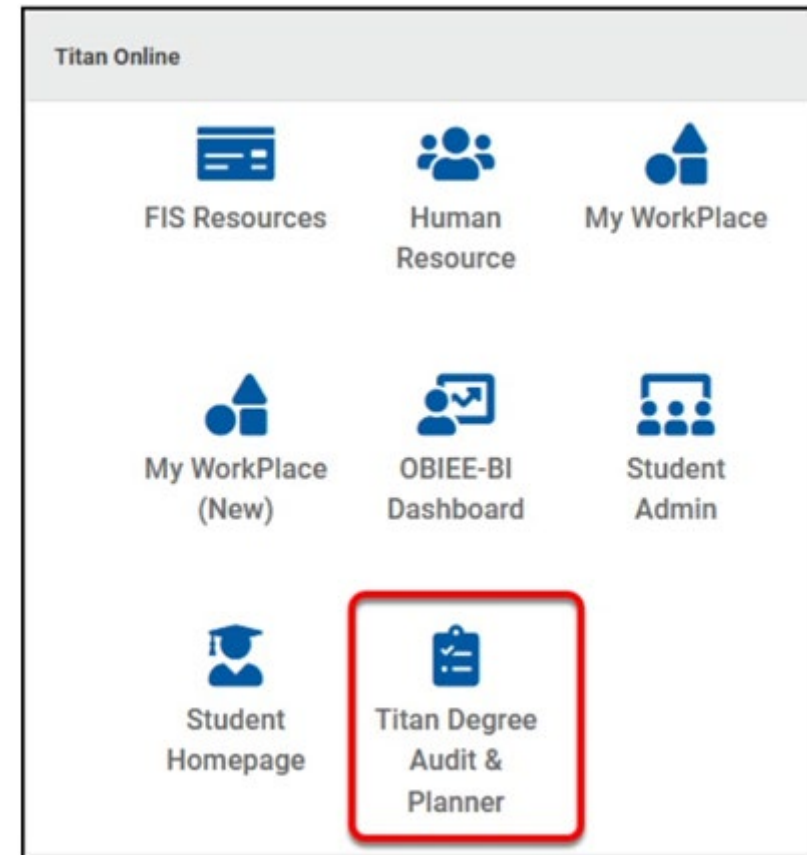

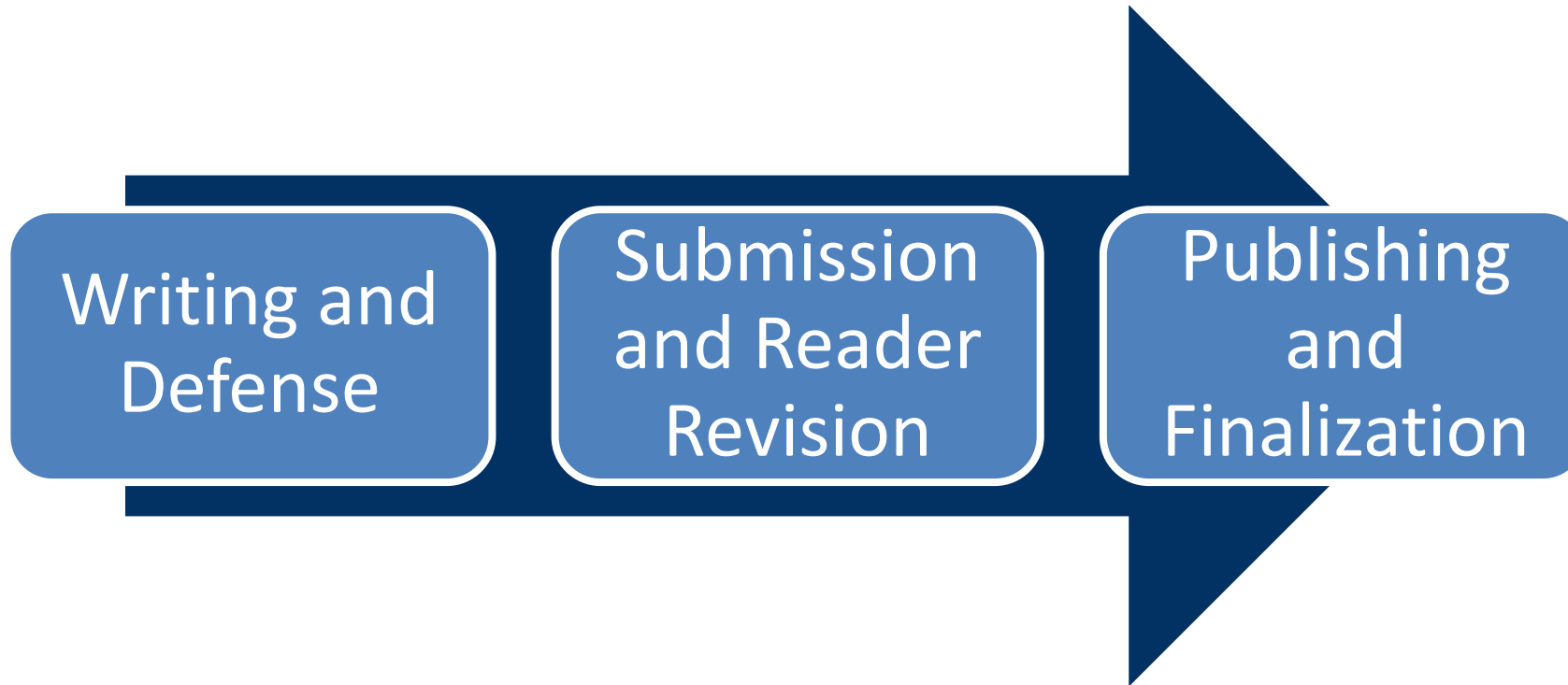

Writing and Defense

1. Student reads Thesis/Dissertation Manual and Template
2. Student writes paper
3. Student defends paper
4. Student makes all committee-requested edits

*Student pastes paper into Template and formats all work

Submission and Reader Revisions

1. Student submits paper in Template using Submission Form
2. Committee members sign Verification Form emailed to them
3. Thesis/Dissertation Reader reviews paper and works with student to finalize formatting, accessibility, and citations and references

Publishing and Finalization

1. Reader and student agree that all Reader revisions are complete and paper is ready to publish
2. Paper is published online using Zenodo (and later ScholarWorks)
3. Graduate Studies is alerted to student's completion

Basic Needs Services



We connect students who experience an unforeseen hardship that results in food, housing, and/or financial insecurity to available on and/or off-campus resources.

Students who submit a basic needs services request meet with staff to discuss their circumstances and determine which resources and services may best meet their needs.

Availability of certain basic needs services may be paused or adjusted. Updates to services will be posted throughout the semester on our online request form.

Basic Needs Services Eligibility Criteria

1

Currently enrolled and matriculated during the semester of their request, including winter and summer sessions.

2

Enrolled at least part-time (graduate and undergraduate) in the semester of their request.

3

In good academic standing (2.0 GPA).
Requests from students with a GPA lower than 2.0 might be reviewed.

4

Experiencing a current, recent unanticipated basic needs insecurity during the semester seeking assistance.

All requests are carefully reviewed by the Care Review Committee

Types of Basic Needs Assistance



Food Assistance:

Intended as short-term assistance while students are connected to **long-term** resources such as CalFresh or pantries.



Hygiene Products:

Students can access up to **5** full-sized hygiene products per month at the Basic Needs Center.



Temporary Housing:

For students who experience a current, immediate, unexpected housing situation.

Students may be housed for up to 3 weeks in an on-campus apartment while they acquire stable and permanent housing.



Tuffy's Career Closet:

Provides students with gently worn professional attire.

Students can access up to **6** items of professional attire per month.



Basic Needs Grant:

For students who experience an unforeseen financial hardship and seek assistance with unpaid basic needs expenses they cannot resolve.

***Hygiene products and Tuffy's Career Closet can be accessed during operating hours.**

Introducing Title IX and Gender Equity at CSUF

Title IX: A Federal Civil Rights Law

- Prohibits discrimination, harassment, and other misconduct on the basis of sex, gender, and sexual orientation at every educational institution that receives federal funding
 - Applies to all education programs and activities at CSUF, including classes, extracurriculars, and employment, with very limited exceptions
- You have rights under Title IX to attend classes and extracurriculars without experiencing barriers based on gender, sexual orientation, or pregnancy status
- Individuals who have experienced, witnessed, or are concerned about misconduct related to Title IX are encouraged to contact Title IX and Gender Equity
- There is no time limit to report alleged misconduct

Title IX and Gender Equity: Our Office

- Ensures students and employees understand CSUF's commitment to Title IX as well as each person's rights and options following possible misconduct
- Conducts ongoing training for students and employees
- Hosts awareness and prevention events to empower our community to create a safer, more inclusive campus
- Addresses reports and complaints through Supportive Measures, investigations, and informal resolutions

CSU Nondiscrimination Policy

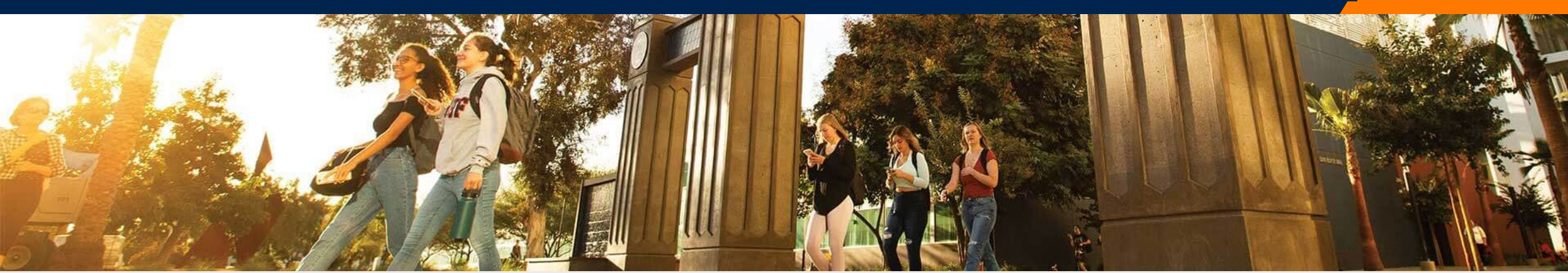
- The CSU Nondiscrimination Policy defines and prohibits the following behaviors that are addressed by CSUF's Title IX and Gender Equity Office:
 - Discrimination based on Gender or Sexual Orientation
 - Harassment based on Gender or Sexual Orientation
 - Sexual Harassment
 - Sexual Exploitation
 - Sexual Misconduct/Sexual Assault
 - Dating Violence and Domestic Violence
 - Stalking
 - Prohibited Consensual Relationships (*between employees and students/employees over whom they exercise direct or significant authority*)
 - Retaliation for reporting or opposing any of the above misconduct and/or for supporting someone else in reporting or opposing misconduct
- Uses Gender as an umbrella term to include:
 - Gender identity
 - Sex assigned at birth
 - Gender expression
 - Sex stereotypes
 - Pregnancy, termination of pregnancy, childbirth, breastfeeding, and related medical conditions

Note on Annual Training

CSU Policy requires annual training for all students about Title IX-related policies, resources, rights, and options. CSUF's mandatory annual student training is on Canvas.

Please look for emails and Canvas notifications to complete the training in early September. Failure to complete the training by early October will result in a registration hold, which blocks adding/dropping classes.

What the CSU Nondiscrimination Policy Means for Our Campus

- Everyone has the right to engage in all CSU education programs and activities without facing misconduct, harassment, discrimination, or violence that is either sexual in nature or based on their sex, Gender, or sexual orientation
- CSUF strives to develop and maintain a safe and welcoming campus community, and all of us have a role to play
- The Title IX and Gender Equity office at CSUF is the office responsible for both prevention efforts and prompt and equitable responses to these matters
- Most CSUF employees are categorized as *Responsible Employees* who have a duty to report all allegations of potential Nondiscrimination Policy violations to Title IX and Gender Equity
- Everyone has the right to report misconduct, support someone else in reporting, and access campus resources/processes without facing Retaliation, which is adverse action that has a materially negative effect on their ability to participate at CSUF. Retaliation is prohibited.
- Students reporting alleged sexual/gender-based misconduct will not be subject to discipline for student conduct issues that occurred at or near the same time
- After receiving a report, Title IX and Gender Equity reaches out to the impacted person to center their needs and provide options
- One option is Supportive Measures, which are free services to help impacted students proceed personally and academically without further barriers
