D.O. (Osteopathic Medicine)

Advising Sheet

Osteopathic medicine has some differences compared to the traditional M.D. degree. They receive more training on how a disease or exposure can lead to other, less apparent health outcomes. D.O.s also receive one year of training on osteopathic manipulative medicine (OMM), as an alternative conventional treatment including prescription medication and surgery. D.O.s are licensed all throughout the United States, and can be employed through private practice, military, and in all types of specialties for health care companies. D.O.s often work in the same positions as M.Ds in healthcare facilities. However a higher proportion of D.O.s specialize in primary care compared to M.Ds..

A degree in osteopathic medicine requires four years of study: two years dedicated to sciences, and two to clinical rotations. After graduating, a student may receive a 12-month internship approved by the American Osteopathic Association, and may then enter either a M.D. or D.O. residency that may last an additional three to eight years depending on the specialty the student wishes to pursue.

Application Timeline

January

- Review AACOMAS website
- Start researching various medical schools
- Inquire about Intent to Apply at the Health Professions Advising Office on campus

February

- Request letters of evaluation from letter writers
- Intent to Apply packet due
- Register for MCAT, if you have not already
- Begin drafting personal statement

March

- Revise personal statement with HPAO advisor
- Keep researching schools

April/May

- Take MCAT at the latest in May
- Look into AACOMAS application opening up

June/July

- Finalize and submit AACOMAS application
- Work with Intent to Apply to send your Committee Packet out via AACOMAS

August

- Secondary applications start to come out
- Verify school deadlines for submitting paperwork

September-December

- Continue Secondary applications
- Interview and visit with schools
- Make an appointment with the CSUF Career Center and HPAO for a mock interview to practice.
