HONORS STUDENT PROFILE BRIAN SAPROSANTOS

My name is Brian Saporsantos, and I graduated Summa Cum Laude with a B.A. in psychology and earned a minor in Human Services. At California State University, Fullerton, I participated heavily in the Department of Psychology. During Spring 2022, I served as a Teaching Assistant for PSYC 202: Research Methods in Psychology where I led weekly office hours and provided tutoring to students. Under the guidance of Dr. Russell Espinoza, I participated as a Research Assistant in his research lab during the 2022-2023 academic year. This was where my passion for psychology and law began because I started conducting research on juror bias. Specifically, I learned more about how certain identities can

be treated differently when they are defendants in a court of law.

What did you like the most about the University Honors Program?

Completing the Senior Honors Project (SHP) was my favorite part of the University Honors Program. Because of this requirement, I was able to work closely with my mentor, Dr. Espinoza, who provided guidance and expertise on juror bias research. As an established jury consultant, he helped me develop my project from start to finish. The SHP also allowed me to grow my presenting skills as an undergraduate researcher by aiving me the opportunity to present at conferences like the

Summer Undergraduate Research Academy (SUReA) Conference and Student and Creative Activities and Research (SCAR) Day. Therefore, without the SHP, I would not have been able to grow my skills within the field of academia.

Tell us about your project and how it relates to your future goals?

For my project, I examined juror bias in the legal system using the theory of aversive racism. Aversive racism is a contemporary, implicit form of racial prejudice that occurs when people use nonracial factors to explain their prejudice against racial minorities. For my study, I wanted to examine this bias with Filipino immigrant defendants because Asian Americans are underrepresented in this research field, even though they are one of the fastest-growing populations in the U.S. Post-undergrad, I plan to pursue a career in Forensic Psychology where I can continue doing work on reducing biases within the United States Justice System.

What advice do you have for students?

Get involved and make those connections! During your time as an undergraduate, networking with other students, faculty/staff, speakers, etc. can help you get one foot ahead when you begin searching for careers in the future. Meeting one person can expand your opportunities in ways you would never expect, so imagine the possibilities when you interact with many others while at CSUF. I never would have thought that research and law would be of any interest to me until I met my mentor! So, go out there, be authentic, and trust the process.

HONORS FACULTY PROFILE DR. HANNAH CARBAJAL

Dr. Carbajal has been teaching in the University Honors program since 2016. She currently teaches HONR 100: Introduction to University Honors colloquium, HONR 101A: Critical Thinking, and HONR 101B: Oral Communication. She also teaches an upper division course on called That's Offense: Consuming Stand-Up Comedy in the Age of Cancel Culture, which stems from her experiences doing openmic stand-up comedy, improv, and sketch comedy in Los Angeles.

Growing up, both of Dr. Carbajal's parents were public school teachers who instilled in her a love of learning. She always had an interest in other languages and discovered an appreciation for literature when she was an undergraduate student. After she graduated with her bachelor's degree, she enrolled in a dual-Master's program at Bowling Green State University that allowed her to spend time in France and Spain. She completed her Ph.D. in Hispanic Literatures with a minor in French and Francophone Studies at Indiana University.

Dr. Carbajal says that she loves teaching in Honors and is so grateful to get to work with CSUF Honors students - "they come to class with an openness to share of themselves and listen to teach other". Her favorite memory has been linked to her class on Comedy and Cancel Culture, which focuses on the cultural contents in which comedy is produced. During this class, students also practice close readings of performances and discuss how the public carries ethical responsibilities as consumers of entertainment - "The first semester it was offered, a controversial social media personality came to CSUF and was performing in the quad. We moved our class outside so that we could all participate in the spectacle. The discussion in our following session was interesting since this performance tied into many of the course themes. We all were provoked, offended, and amused."

When asked what advice she has to offer for students in the Honors program, she shared the following:

"I want students to eliminate the word "lazy" from their vocabularies. Many have full class-loads, work, commute, maintain friendships and care for families. Then, when they find themselves procrastinating, they accuse themselves of being "lazy," when really, their minds and bodies are demanding they take time for themselves. So, along with allowing grace for themselves, I recommend keeping open lines of communication with their professors. Ask professors at the beginning of the semester what their policies are on mental health days and extensions for assignments, and touch base throughout the course."





HONORS ASSISTANT DIRECTOR BECCA CALVILLO

We are excited to introduce you to Becca Calvillo, Assistant Director for the University Honors program. Becca has been a member of the Titan community for the past five years where she worked in the Office of Housing and Residential Engagement as a Community Coordinator and Assistant Director for Administration and Conference Services. Becca received her Master's degree from the University of Southern California in Postsecondary Administration Student Affairs, where she also worked with students in their Honors College. She is originally from Chicago and received a Bachelor's degree in English with a minor in Classical Civilization from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign.

Becca serves as the advisor for all students in the Four-Year Honors pathway and leads orientations for the new incoming students each fall. Becca also spearheads several of our center initiatives, including working with our Honors Student Advisory Committee and hosting our co-curricular programming in the Honors Center.

With 11 years' experience in Student Affairs, and 7 years' experience working with Honors students, Becca advises students through a lens of support, holistic development, equity, and access.

HONORS EXPERIENCES

Honors Student Advisory Council

Our students hosted several events, including a game night, finals study nights, bowling at the TSU, and a resume workshop.

Social Justice

In February, the Honors program hosted our Social Justice Speakers Series with Justin Brooks, Professor of Law at University of San Diego and author of the book "You Might Go to Prison Even If You Are Innocent". His book highlights his three decades of experience working on cases of wrongful conviction. Joining him was one of his exonerated clients. Kimberly Long, who spent 7 years and 3 months in California State Prison for a murder that she did not commit.

Peer Mentoring

Students in the HONR 200 colloquium class serve as peer mentors in the HONR 100 colloquium. This allows new students to become connected with the honors program and the campus as a whole. It also gives mentors the opportunity to develop their leadership and networking skills.



SUMMER 2024 TO SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA STUDY ABROAD

During the month of June, our Honors students traveled to Sydney, Australia for a study abroad experience on Indigenous culture, justice, and gender-based violence. Led by UHP Director Dr. Stacy Mallicoat, nine CSUF students were joined by 16 students and Dr. Denise Paquette-Boots from the University of Texas-Dallas As part of this four-week experience, students met with a number of non-profit leaders and community and justice officials to explore how issues of culture and violence impact the legal and social experiences of Aboriginal communities. The city was our classroom as we also toured spaces such as the Sydney Opera House, the New South Wales Legislature, and the Blue Mountains. Of course, no trip to the land down under is complete without time with koalas and kangaroos.

We learned about the effects of colonization and gentrification on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island people. Students had the opportunity to explore how policies such as the Stolen Generations and the loss of land rights have led to intergenerational trauma and the loss of culture for indigenous families. We also learned about the rising issues of gender based violence and how policies and the justice system are responding to these issues.

We also had the opportunity to give back to the local community by volunteering with two local organizations. At Kids Giving Back, we prepared meals for over 150 individuals who are food-insecure. We also spent time with Thread Together, who works with clothing manufacturers throughout Australia to prevent the dumping of fast fashion and excess stock into landfills. During our day, we sorted through pallets of new clothing, and prepared it for delivery to local schools and organizations that serve survivors of domestic violence, people who have lost their homes from fires and floods as a result of climate change, and others in need. This program was supported by funding from the ASI Instructionally-Related Activities fee and Consolidated Course Fees, as well as support from the Center for Internships and Community Engagement and our generous donors.
