

College Access and Career Pathways

**CSUF Sets Record with
Largest Incoming Class as
Diversity Grows Across Campus**

Fall 2023 enrollment is the **largest incoming class in CSUF history**,

including 7,127 first time freshmen and 4,297 undergraduate transfers.

- » For Spring 2024, there were 5,447 new UDT applications, with 3,237 admitted and 1,316 accepting.
- » Met Spring 2024 target of 1,500 with 1,567 enrolled Transfer students.
- » Fall 2023 & Fall 2024 admitted students, broken down by ethnicity. The year-to-year change is the change for that specific ethnic group for Fall 23 to Fall 24
- » .These numbers are for all student categories First Time Freshmen (FTF), Upper Division Transfer (UDT), Graduate and Postbac students).

- » **Increased applications of black students by 13% (2,558 to 2,903)**
- » **Increase from Asian/ Pacific Islander students by 7% (16,060 to 17,148)**
- » **Increase for Hispanic students by 10% (39,279 to 43,177)**
- » **Increase for multi race students by 7% (3,209 to 3,435)**



Career Center

Empowering Titans: From Pachanga to Professional Development

- » The Career Center hosted an HSI Week Pachanga Event, part-time job fairs, and internship and career expos.
- » The department held four Fall semester career fairs that totaled 3,286 student attendees.
- » The I Am First... cohort (1st/2nd years) featured 30 total participants.
- » The I Am First... program equips first-generation college students with the confidence, self-awareness, and career readiness knowledge to jumpstart into a successful journey towards achieving career and leadership development.

- » The career center hosted a two-day Disney internship program event.

Expanding Educational Access: New Grants, Partnerships, and Scholarships Uplift Future Titans

- » GEAR UP, Education Talent Search, and Upward Bound began program services at 10 high schools within Anaheim Union High School District and Santa Ana Unified School District.



EQUITY

- » The Career Center, in collaboration with JCPenney, hosted a Suit-Up event at Brea Mall, offering CSUF students, alumni, staff, and faculty a 30% discount on professional attire, shoes, and accessories, with exclusive shopping hours after the store closed to the public.

- » The Center for Educational Partnerships was awarded a new seven-year GEAR UP Grant \$4.1 million.
- » The grant will be a new collaboration with Fullerton Joint High School District, La Habra School District, and Buena Park School District
- » Fullerton Educational Partnerships, in collaboration with Fullerton College, and FJUHSU, hosted the Counselor Professional Development Day on Friday, September 29 for approximately 55 FJUHSU staff. Presentations included

CSUF Admissions, Office of Financial Aid, and Outreach and Recruitment.

Santa Ana Innovation Scholars

Successfully recruited 37 new Innovation Scholars (First-time freshmen from Santa Ana Unified School District and Transfer Students from Santa Ana College), giving out \$74,000 in scholarships.

- » Renewed a new five-year contract with Anaheim Public Utilities to offer CSUF students internships within the utilities department (\$83,596 in value).
- » Hosted the annual McNair Research Symposium, which showcased the diverse research of our 26 scholars.
 - » Roughly 80 faculty, staff, administrators, alumni, students, and loved ones joined this celebratory event. Janet Brown, representative for U.S. Representative Lou Correa's Office, California's 46th Congressional District, also attended and congratulated scholars' impressive research accomplishments.

The Center for Educational Partnerships was one of eight proposals to be awarded the 2024 Scott Jewett Grant for \$144,000 to support pre -prospective students and transfer initiatives. This is the third consecutive year CEP has been awarded a Scott Jewett Grant.

Support secured to enhance partnerships totaled \$244,000.

Financial Aid

Creating Student Success Through Financial Support

- » Middle-Class Scholarship- disbursed over \$23.4 Million to 16,530 students for Spring 2024.
- » This represents an increase of \$6.7 Million over the prior year and 1,507 more Titans!
- » 139 students (~50% seniors) saved with the use of Graduation Initiative 2025 funds in Fall 2023.
- » Developed the new Titan Hub, which included a Scholarship Center for students to use.
- » The Office of Financial Aid saved 2,272 Titans from disenrollment in Fall 2024 utilizing \$1.25 million in discretionary funds. Almost 40% of students saved were seniors.
- » The Office of Financial Aid also prevented 1,102 students from being disenrolled for Titan A, B, and C for non-payment of fees for Spring 2024 using \$847,265 in discretionary funds.





Outreach, Recruitment and Orientation

Increasing Engagement Across Campus

- » Outreach, Recruitment and Orientation (ORO) hosted Titan Welcome Weekend to welcome Fall 2023 incoming students and their families to campus.
 - » A total of 2,363 total guests were in attendance, including 1,220 students.
- » The department held a webinar series throughout the year for prospective students, discussing the following topics: The CSU System, CSUF Highlights, Cal State Apply, Career Center, Nursing, Financial Aid, Scholarships, TAPP, and Student Life & Leadership.
- » The ORO team supported diversity, equity, and inclusion recruitment efforts by attending the following:
 - » The 37th Annual Young Black Scholars Academic Kickoff and College Fair, the 51st Annual Barona Powwow, Sycuan's 34th Annual Pow-Wow, the 17th Annual African American Male Student Success Summit, and the Latino College Expo at Cal Poly Pomona.
 - » The department also attended Black History Parade & the Unity Festival, Black College Expos in San Diego and Los Angeles, and the Education Summit: College and Resource Fair at Cal State East Bay.
- » The Outreach team, CSUF staff, faculty, students, and President Alva visited Christ Our Redeemer AME Church for Super Sunday.
- » In partnership with the African American faith community, CSUF shared valuable resources and emphasized the importance of higher education. Virtual recordings were also shared with other partner churches, like Second Baptist and Friendship Baptist Church.

The Outreach and Recruitment team participated in 38 Signing Day events, including transfer celebrations, to congratulate over 800 students on their admission to CSUF

COMMUNITY

- » The Outreach, Recruitment, and Orientation department enthusiastically welcomed thousands of students and their families to campus at Experience CSUF: Become A Titan, highlighting everything CSUF has to offer.
- » Experience CSUF: Become A Titan was filled with exciting activities, including open houses, campus tours, sessions on financial aid and next steps, a resource fair, academic information sessions, delicious food, and much more.
- » The team saw significant growth in participation compared to 2023, with 17,688 total RSVPs (a 24.9% increase from 2023) and 9,628 guests checked in (a 6.3% increase from 2023).

- » In addition, the department hosted a successful virtual "Experience CSUF" week through Zoom and Titan on Demand platforms, with 293 students in attendance.
- » Similarly, the team also led Experience CSUF: Black Faculty & Student Panel and Reception, Experience CSUF: Student Performances, and an Experience CSUF: Native American Reception.
- » The department also began offering Experience CSUF: Spanish Tours

Athletics Academic Services

Elevating Student-Athlete
Support and Academic
Excellence

Athletics Academic Services (AAS) successfully worked with Admissions to process, evaluate, and admit **177 student-athletes** for the incoming class of **Fall 2023**

- » The department continued to advise student-athletes, ensuring comprehensive GE advisement, developing course schedules aligned with degree requirements to maintain eligibility, and mandating returning student-athletes to meet with counselors for GE advisement.
- » Additionally, AAS hosted Life Skills programming for student-athletes, including a worship on athlete identity exploration, drug and alcohol training, career exploration, and violence prevention education.

Athletic Academic Services' DEGREE (Division I, Eligibility, Graduation, Retention, Engage, Empower) Program continued to operate both in-person and virtually, serving 214 student-athletes, providing proactive support and academic assistance on a weekly basis.

- » The DEGREE program was developed to better support underserved, first-generation, and academically underprepared student-athletes, with an emphasis on addressing APR concerns, objective-based study time, academic mentoring, tutoring, and assistance for students with education-impacting disabilities.

- » The department hosted events including the Fullerton Athletics Career Expo, various DEGREE Student Staff Training workshops, completed counselor searches, planned Life Skills events, held Titan Awards Night and Senior Recognition Dinner, presented to the University Council of Chairs, and met with the Registrar's Office for NCAA certification support.

Center for Scholars

Elevating Student-Athlete Support and Academic Excellence

PRIDE

- » The Center for Scholars moved into a new space in Gordon Hall and hosted a ribbon cutting ceremony to celebrate.

Abrego Future Scholars:

- » Supported 53 total AFS Scholars (26 funded), awarding \$19,500 in funds to AFS scholars.

My Future Pathways Scholars

- » Supported 12 MFP Scholars through 12 scholarships, totaling \$24,000 in awarded money.

Nicholas Academic Center Scholars

- » The department supported 138 NAC Scholars (106 funded).

Sun Family Scholars

- » Supported 10 Sun Scholars with 10 scholarships, totaling \$31,250.

Guardian Scholars

- » The department increased the number of Foster Youth supported by 24% from 2022-23 to 2023-24 (112 vs. 90).
- » Partnered with Housing and Residential Engagement to ensure Foster Youth in need of housing year-round were set correctly (24 students were supported).

President's Scholars

- » Supported 51 President's Scholars (50 funded), awarding \$195,708.50 along with parking permits, a bus pass, and 15 new laptops.

Male Success Initiative - Fullerton

Empowering Narratives: Men of Color Library and Expanding Support with Pride Talks and Events

Male Success Initiative-Fullerton unveiled a special Men of Color Library Collection

- » The collection houses more than 400 narratives that center on the experiences of men of color throughout history and across different disciplines.
- » The center unveiled the collection during a Nov. 8, 2024 ribbon-cutting ceremony, inviting faculty, staff and students to celebrate the curation of these stories. The collection is housed in the MSI Center, located in Gordon Hall 229, and is available to all campus community members.



INNOVATION

- » MSI-Fullerton was awarded a Research, Scholarly, and Creative Activity Grant from the CSUF Office of Research to build a library for our CSUF men of color in the Male Success Initiative Center.
- » In collaboration with Counseling and Psychological Services, MSI held a Pride Talks series on "Celebrating Pride: Parade Culture," highlighting the importance of allyship.
- » The department began hosting MSI Pride Talks, which served as opportunities for the MSI brothers to discuss topics regarding gender identity.

- » Partnering with Counseling and Psychological Services, MSI hosted "Mindful Men," a drop-in session where participants discussed self-awareness and personal experiences.
- » MSI celebrated the year's achievements with "The Gathering," welcoming over 160 students and guests, featuring three graduating MSI members as keynote speakers.
- » MSI staff and student leaders supported Explore CSUF and, alongside Educational Partnerships and the Aspire Grant, hosted a Young Men of Color Empowerment Conference, bringing 150 young men to learn about transferring to a four-year degree.

Educational Opportunity Program

Building Bridges: EOP Learning Community Inspires Students

- » The Educational Opportunity Program (EOP) learning community helped students with time management, embracing their community cultural wealth, and embracing their identities. Through a reflective experience, they have been able to develop language to help empower navigating CSUF as first-generation college students.

- » The EOP learning community helped students prepare for summer internships by working with career center specialists to review resumes and navigate the campus website for internship opportunities.
- » EOP collaborated with Basic Needs and the Career Center to host workshops for students, focusing on building resumes and finding summer internships.
- » EOP staff received training on Title IX, HRDI, and conflict management, and toured the ASI Pantry to learn about its new space, hours, and offerings.

The EOP Summer Bridge (SB) Kick-Off on June 24th marked the start of the college journey for 30 students, who took a Math course at CSUF and participated in afternoon workshops and study hall hosted by the EOP program.

- » The first week wrapped up with a Friday field trip to Boomer's theme park, where students engaged in community-building activities, games, and lunch.
- » Throughout the program, SB students attended workshops on Financial Aid, Financial Planning/Literacy, EOP History, adapting to college life, and took part in Supplemental Instruction sessions.

TRIO Student Support Services

National TRIO Day and Enrollment Milestone

- » The department celebrated National TRIO Day in February 2024 and highlighted its alumni through various mediums, including a specialized social media campaign.
- » TRIO SSS also reached its target goal of enrolled participants at 165 students.

Transfer Adult Re-entry Parenting & Pregnant Student Center

Enriching TAPP Student Experiences

- » Titan Welcome Weekend: The TAPP Center tabled to share info about our center and welcome students.
- » The department also hosted a Peer Mentorship Kickoff event, introducing mentors

to mentees, highlighting the program, and hosting community-building activities.

- » During the third week of October, the TAPP Center hosted several programs throughout 2023 National Transfer Student Week, including meals, meetups, and workshops.
- » The week culminated with the #TRANSFERFEST celebration on October 19 from 10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. on the Tuffy Lawn between the Student Recreation Center (SRC) and Titan Gym.
- » The event had live music, performances, free food, a 360-photo booth, and a video game truck.
- » The TAPP Center participated in the Coordinated Community Response Team Meeting and tabled at the Women's Resource Center Welcome Event, inviting students to upcoming TAPP Center activities.
- » In honor of Student-Parent Month, the TAPP Center hosted a Family Pool Day, a Student Parent Lunch Mixer,

and a mentor meeting where peer mentors received training on supporting students in distress.

- » The TAPP Center also hosted various workshops and events, such as Navigating Transitions as a Transfer Student Workshop, Spring Transfer Welcome, TAPP Family Welcome, Scholarship Essay Writing Workshop, and more.
- » Hosted Cal State Fullerton's 2024 Transfer Summit, a one-day event to promote inclusive transfer and pathways from community colleges to CSUF, with special focus on students from underserved communities.

Veterans Resource Center

Strengthening the Military Community

- » Veterans Resource Center staff tabled at Titan Welcome Weekend, providing information and answering questions about services for military-connected students while distributing promotional items.



- » The Veterans Resource Center hosted a series of events in September, including a virtual open house, a Welcome Back event at Angels Stadium, a VET NET ALLY training, and a tabling event to promote VRC services.
- » Additionally, they organized a community-building event at CSUF Angels Night, where 60 military-connected students attended, and hosted the Regional SVA Workshop focused on rebuilding after COVID.

Hosted the 12th Annual Women Veterans in Higher Education Conference that featured a powerful women's veteran panel and workshops, creating a dynamic and inclusive space for female veterans to thrive while fostering community, understanding, and opportunities for allies and dependents to gain insights into the female veteran perspective.

- » Veterans Ambassador Program (VAP):
 - » Conducted multiple virtual CSU Apply workshops for prospective student veterans, hosted prospective military students, and attended regional meetings with VRC directors and veteran organizations.
 - » VAP also attended the CSU Young Males of Color

Conference.

- » Advising, Certification, and Training (ACT):
 - » Managed VA benefit certifications, collaborated with CSUF Admissions on residency waivers, and developed training materials for the Cal Vet Fee Waiver process.
- » VetForward (V4W):
 - » Hosted workshops on cover letter development, interview preparation, and job searching to support students in their career readiness and professional development.
- » Veteran Women and Families Program (WAF):
 - » Assisted students with on-campus resources, hosted planning meetings, and provided relocation support for female veterans and their families.
 - » Worked with CSUF Admissions on residency waivers, and developed training materials for the Cal Vet Fee Waiver process.
- » Veteran Women and Families Program (WAF):

Engagement and Well-Being

Basic Needs

Supporting Basic Needs

- » Basic Needs Services engaged diverse student and staff audiences, promoting essential basic needs services and resources.
- » The team delivered several educational presentations for the campus community, including a Basic Needs Services Overview for Career Coaches, an Overview for RA Training, and an Overview for EOP.
- » Additionally, the department tabled at various events such as the FDC Resources Fair, the Business Graduate Resource Fair, the ASI Resource and Staff Development Resource Fair, Titan Welcome Weekend, and the CalFresh table at the ASI Pop-Up Pantry.
- » The team also gave various presentations, including Basic Needs Ambassador Training, CalFresh Outreach and Enrollment, Let's Get Financially Fit, Titan Bites Administrator Training, and Smart Shopping Strategies.
- » Titan Bites Administrator Training (Feb 2024): This training guides faculty and staff on becoming certified to send Titan Bites alerts through the iFullerton app, helping connect students to free or discounted meals.



WELL-BEING

Basic Needs Ambassador Training: This training equips faculty and staff with the knowledge and skills to address student food, housing, and financial insecurity, focusing on cultural considerations and setting boundaries when working with students facing basic needs challenges.

Care Services/ Dean of Students

Keeping campus safe

- » Care Services facilitated several trainings for both on-campus and off-campus partners, including Helping Students in Distress, Student Resources Overview, Care Services Overview, Helping Peers in Distress, and Be Aware, Take Care.

Counseling and Psychological Services

Supporting Mental Health and Wellness

- » Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS) hosted multiple dog therapy events for students.
- » The department hired an eating disorder therapist, two new counselors and doubled its Mental Wellness Peer Educator team of student staff.
- » CAPS, in partnership with the CSUF Police Department, launched the Mobile Crisis Unit and hired two counselors. The focus of the Mobile Crisis Unit is to support crisis situations after hours.

Housing & Residential Engagement

Living Up Campus

- » Housing Orientation Weekend was held August 17-19, 2023, featuring events like a Carnival, Casino Night, Live Band karaoke, and a variety of workshops.
- » Housing & Residential Engagement collaborated with campus partners to connect residents to campus events like the IT Movie Night, Titan Welcome, and the SRC's Rec'd All Night event.

Student Conduct

Caring for the Community

- » The Department of Student Conduct hosted a series of training sessions on topics including Generative AI, academic integrity, and unauthorized AI use, with presentations to HSS faculty, new tenure-track faculty, international students, student leaders, faculty retreats, supplemental instruction leaders, and business and economics chairs.
- » The department also participated in various tabling events, including at Discoverfest and within various campus colleges.



TitanHealth

Ensuring Community Health and Wellness

- » Titan Health encompasses three identifying departments: TitanMED (clinical services), TitanWELL (health promotion services), and TitanTHRIVE.
- » TitanHEALTH hosted WellFest and saw more than 400 student visitors.
 - » WellFest is an open house opportunity for Cal State Fullerton students to tour the clinic, meet medical providers, attend health and wellness workshops, and learn more about free and low-cost resources available on campus.
- » TitanHEALTH held its Annual Flu Clinic in October 2023, distributing a total of 871 flu vaccines to CSUF students.

The 22nd Annual Violence Prevention Conference, titled "Growing a Culture of Care: Titans Cultivating Care," featured keynote speaker Chanel Miller, 150+ registrations, 40+ volunteers, three community organizations (Waymakers, Radiant Futures, and Human Options), one campus partner, and six breakout sessions addressing topics like trauma-informed practices, survivor voices, and healthy masculinities.

- » The TitanTHRIVE team was awarded a \$500,000 grant from the US Department of Justice, Office of Violence Against Women, to fund a 4-year Culturally Specific Programming initiative focused on Hispanic-Serving Institutions, aiming to build capacity and partnerships with groups like DIRC, DSS, and TAPP Center.
- » Clothesline Project: 500+ attendees, in partnership with Waymakers & TitanWELL.
- » Denim Day: 500+ attendees, partnered with two CSUF academic partners, one FSL partner, and TitanWELL.
- » Introduced the Healing Spaces series, focusing on collective and community-based healing.
- » Expanded the TT paraprofessional training program and rebranded with a new name and identity to better reflect its mission.




Title IX

Educating and Safeguarding Campus

- » Title IX conducted various training sessions for students and staff throughout the year, including Title IX trainings, Resident Advisor trainings, and student wellness trainings, as well as presentations for ASI leaders, graduate student orientation, and new employee orientation.

The department visited on-campus classes to provide overviews of their services and conducted multiple trainings and tabling events for students and staff, including presentations for ROTC, new employee orientations, sports clubs, and Discoverfest, as well as hosting Title IX, consent pop-up events, and a student ambassador program.

Student Programs and Engagement

- » ASI Student Programs and Engagement (SPE) is devoted to producing programs that are inclusive, innovative, and motivational. The goal of the department is to unify different campus communities and enhance the Titan experience.
- » During the past year, SPE continued its large traditional programs such as All-Day ASI, Late Night Study, the ASI Carnival and the annual Spring Concert, which are all foundational aspects to the Titan Experience.

Food Pantry

- » Since its inception in August 2021, the ASI Food Pantry has become a vital resource for the campus community, striving to alleviate food insecurity among enrolled CSUF students.

During 2023-2024, the department received significant boosts to ASI operations through generous donations: **nearly \$6,000 during the CSUF Day of Giving and a substantial grant of \$71,000** for the purchase of additional refrigeration equipment, including cold storage lockers for patrons.

- » These enhancements have enabled ASI to better serve the growing number of students in need.

Esports Lounge

- » In the Fall 2023 semester, the ASI Esports Lounge welcomed 3,491 visitors, establishing itself as a thriving hub for gaming enthusiasts on campus.
- » In the Spring 2024 semester, the Esports Lounge experienced a surge in student registrations, with approximately 563 students signing up to utilize ASI's facilities.
- » Collectively, these dedicated gamers have contributed 3,587 hours and 13 minutes to gaming sessions, averaging about 1 hour and 6 minutes per session.

Titan Athletics

Women's Soccer Earns 10th Regular Season Title

- » In 2023, the Cal State Fullerton Titan women's soccer team won the Big West Championship for the 10th time in program history.
- » The team earned six accolades, including two major awards, and had four players named to the All-Big West First Team for the first time since 2015.
- » They also placed at least one player on the All-Big West Freshman team for the 11th consecutive season.

Men's Soccer Earns 10th Regular Season Title

- » In 2023, the Cal State Fullerton Titan men's soccer team won the Big West Championship for the first time since 2017 and the third time in program history.
- » They set a new program record with an 11-game unbeaten streak, defeating or tying top-ranked teams like Gonzaga, Washington, LMU, Air Force and UCLA.
- » The Titans earned five out of six Big West player of the year honors, along with coach of the year and eight all-conference selections.
- » The program set records for both total all-conference selections and first-team selections.

- » Titan softball earned its 32nd NCAA Tournament bid as the No. 3 seed in the Stanford Regional after winning the Big West Championship with a 39-19 record (22-5 record in conference play).

The team secured its 20th conference title in program history by defeating the defending champions, Long Beach State.

- » Coach Kelly Ford, the third all-time head coach in the 45-year history of Titan softball, retired after 31 collegiate seasons.
- » The Titan legend collected 410 wins over 12 seasons as Cal State Fullerton's head softball coach and 865 combined wins as head coach at Mt. San Antonio College and CSUF.
- » Additionally, Coach Ford's legacy included 60 wins against Power 5 programs, six Big West titles, seven NCAA tournament appearances, five Big West Coach of the Year honors, two NFCA Gold Glove recipients, one NFCA Gold Shoe honoree, three All-American awards, eight conference players of the year, six conference pitchers of the year and three defensive players of the year.

- » The NASPA Undergraduate Fellows Program (NUFP) provides undergraduate students from traditionally underrepresented and historically marginalized populations with experiences to support their entry into the Student Affairs profession. This opportunity helps promote diversity within the field of student affairs by broadening the pipeline into the profession itself.
- » 6 total students participated in NUFP in 2023-24.
- » Students are invited to participate in the CSUF-NUFP program, which provides on-campus mentorship, professional development, an intentional curriculum geared towards graduate school in the field of student affairs, and the opportunity to earn conference scholarships.

- » The weeklong event featured social gatherings, panel discussions with campus partners and collaborations with various campus resources.
- » Student Affairs plays a central role in fostering and empowering Latinx student success within the university's diverse community.

In 2021, Cal State Fullerton was named a Fulbright Hispanic-Serving Institution by the U.S. Department of State and received the Seal of Excelencia from Excelencia in Education for its commitment to Latinx student success.
